This month's focus: Differently-Abled People

What is "differently abled"?

Refers to long-term physical, mental, intellectual, or sensory impairments which, in interaction with various attitudinal and environmental barriers, hinder full and effective participation in society on an equal basis with others.

What isn't "differently abled"?

It is **not** something that resides in the individual as the result of some impairment. The categorization of differently abled is the result of society's perception of people and what is considered standard or "normal".

Disability can be physical or mental



Physical, mental, intellectual, or sensory impairments can exist from birth (such as Autism, or physical impairments an individual is born with); they can develop over time (progressive blindness, or degenerative diseases, for instance); or can be the result of an accident or event in the individual's life (a spinal fracture which results in paraplegia). Regardless of the type of impairment, it is something that effects the way in which the effected individual is able to interact with society.




Guaranteeing equal and accessible education by building inclusive learning environments and providing the needed assistance for persons with disabilities

Migrating with a differently-abled child: Akifa's story

Akifa's village was attacked by the militia in 2012, during which her father was killed. She had to escape and went to live in camps and on the streets. In 2014, when she was 6 months pregnant, Akifa went to help her husband at work. They were attacked by the militia and **Akifa** was attacked by multiple men while her husband was beaten and tortured. She was later sent to the hospital and delivered her baby **prematurely**; her daughter suffers from **mental disabilities** because of the incident. Akifa and her family moved to avoid the conflict, eventually reaching Egypt.

Currently, **Akifa** and her family are homeless and are staying in Cairo, where they sleep in coffee shops or at the markets at night. They do not know anyone here and do not know where to go; she is again pregnant. She is suffering from problems with her pregnancy, and her daughter, who has **mental disabilities**, is constantly sick and needs attention.

Financial and medical assistance were provided to Akifa and her baby by IOM until they registered with UNHCR.
